

ALABAMA POWER COMPANY HUNTING AND FISHING PROGRAMS

To provide a range of unique recreational opportunities and access for all levels of mobility, Alabama Power manages more than 3,500 miles of shoreline and annually licenses more than 80,000 acres for recreational hunting.

Throughout its reservoir system, the company maintains six tailrace fishing platforms, one trout stream access as well as 15 fishing piers in conjunction with the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR). The company also provides hunting opportunities in Jackson County at the Skyline Wildlife Management Area in conjunction with ADCNR and two hunting sites featured as part of Alabama's Hunting, Fishing and Shooting Trail for People with Physical Disabilities.

With the exception of Flat Rock Park on the R.L. Harris Reservoir and D.A.R.E. Power Park on the Martin Reservoir, which are open seasonally from May to September, all of Alabama Power's fishing sites are open to the public year-round.

The company's two sites on the Hunting and Fishing Trail for People with Physical Disabilities – R.L. Harris Management Area in Randolph County and Smith Management Area in Walker County – are open three days a week in conjunction with the state hunting season. Hunters approved by the state may request a reservation to the green fields and shooting houses designed specifically to meet the needs of the physically disabled.

The company's license program provides exclusive hunting rights on Alabama Power properties to clubs and operates on a five-year agreement with annual payments. The program operates via a bid process accepted from Feb. 1 to July 31. For more specifics on bid requirements, deadlines and a detailed listing of properties, visit www.alabamapower.com.

SAFELY HUNTING THE RIGHTS OF WAY

In a state dominated by hardwood hollows and pine plantations, wildlife can often be seen along Alabama Power transmission rights of way.

For landowners and their guests, this wildlife activity and low cover provide a unique and fruitful hunting experience that can be enjoyed by both seasoned and first-time hunters. But like any other hunting scenario, caution must be taken in these areas, and additional precautions are necessary when hunting near transmission lines.

In many cases, Alabama Power allows landowners to place hunting structures on the outer five feet of the company's rights of way as long as a minimum distance of 25 feet is maintained from existing transmission structures. In some cases, the company may also ask property owners to relocate structures when additional right of way clearing is necessary.

To ensure the rights of way remain safe for property owners and to provide access for proper operation and maintenance of transmission lines, the following structures – even if temporary – are prohibited and are subject to immediate removal or relocation by Alabama Power:

- Any structure attached to a transmission tower or power poles.
- Structures blocking access or located too close to facilities.
- Structures underneath high-voltage lines.

HUNTING STRUCTURE PLACEMENT


